We also set aside money through our Title I Parent Involvement allocation and other non-categorical dollars to provide partial scholarships for parents to help offset the cost of fingerprinting required by our district of volunteers. Our Parent Teacher Staff Organization has a Volunteer Coordinator who hosts both the Arboga Elementary School PTSO and Arboga Elementary School Facebook pages, posting information about upcoming events, ways to volunteer, soliciting ideas, etc. The school coordinates and integrates the Title I parental involvement program with other programs, and conducts other activities, to encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children.
4. The school distributes information related to school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities to Title I parents in a format and language that the parent understands. We use our School Messenger auto dialer system to make phone calls home. When we have people on site who speak Hmong, Punjabi or Spanish, we are able to record messages in those languages as well.

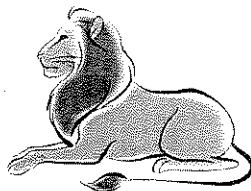
