The Marysville Joint Unified School District began operations in 1966 under the laws of the State of California. This District operates under a locally elected five-member Board form of government and provides educational services to grades K-12 as mandated by the state and federal agencies. The District currently operates 22 school sites, child care/preschool programs in nine locations, and one charter school site.

In November 2008, the voters of Marysville approved by more than the required 55% favorable vote, Measure P, authorizing the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds, not to exceed \$47,000,000. Measure P is a Proposition 39 bond. The passage of Proposition 39 in November 2000 amended the California Constitution to include accountability provisions. Specifically, the District must conduct an annual independent performance audit to ensure that funds have been expended only on the specific projects listed as well as an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of the proceeds have been expended for facilities projects.

Measure P bonds were issued by the District, through the County of Yuba. On August 5, 2009, the first series of the Measure P bond authorization was issued, which consisted of current interest and capital appreciation bonds with an initial par amount of \$34,433,777 with stated interest rates of 5.0% to 5.5% and maturing through August 1, 2036. The principal balance outstanding at June 30, 2018 related to these bonds was \$5,473,777.

On October 25, 2016, the District issued \$28,515,000 of General Obligation Bonds to refund a portion of the 2009 current interest General Obligation Bonds. The bonds mature serially in varying amounts during the succeeding years through August 2034, with interest rates ranging from 3.0% through 5.0%. As a result, the refunded bonds are considered to be defeased, and the related liability for the bonds has been removed from the District's financial statements. Amounts paid to the refunded bond escrow agent in excess of the outstanding debt at the time of payment are recorded as deferred charges on refunding on the statement of net position and are amortized as an expense over the life of the bond. Deferred charges on refunding of \$3,334,692 remain to be amortized. This refunding reduced total debt service payments by \$1,021,174.

As of June 30, 2016, the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee disbanded due to completion of major construction projects.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Measure P Bond Building Fund of Marysville Joint Unified School District (the "District"), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2018, and the related notes to the financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

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Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Measure P Bond Building Fund of Marysville Joint Unified School District, as of June 30, 2018, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis of Matter

As discussed in Note 1A, the financial statements present only the Measure P Bond Building Fund and do not purport to, and do not present fairly the financial position of the Marysville Joint Unified School District, as of June 30, 2018, the changes in its financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated January 24, 2019, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters specific to the Measure P Bond Building Fund. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.


Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2018

NOTE 1 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Entity

The Marysville Joint Unified School District began operations in 1966 under the laws of the State of California. This District operates under a locally elected five-member Board form of government and provides educational services to grades K – 12 as mandated by the State and Federal agencies. The District currently operates 22 school sites, child care/preschool programs in nine locations, and one charter school site.

On November 4, 2008 the District voters authorized \$47 million in Measure P General Obligation Bonds to continue improving the quality of education in local schools and protecting the safety of our children, by repairing, replacing or updating fire alarm systems, worn-out roofs, outdated classrooms and science labs, plumbing and heating/air conditioning systems; and make the District eligible for State matching funds.

An advisory committee to the District's Governing Board and Superintendent, called the Measure P Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee was established pursuant to the requirements of State law and the provisions of Measure P. The Committee's oversight goals include: advising on bond construction priorities, reviewing bond construction plans, reviewing project plans and budgets, and ensuring compliance with the provisions of Measure P.

The statements presented are for the individual Measure P Bond Building Fund of the District, consisting of the net construction proceeds of Measure P Series 2009 general obligation bonds, as issued by the District, through the County of Yuba, and are not intended to be a complete presentation of the District's financial position or results of operations.

B. <u>Accounting Policies</u>

The District accounts for its financial transactions in accordance with the policies and procedures of the California Department of Education's *California School Accounting Manual*. The accounting policies of the District conform to generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA).

C. <u>Basis of Accounting</u>

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the fiscal year in which the resources are measurable and become available. "Available" means the resources will be collectible within the current fiscal year or are expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current fiscal year. Generally, "available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year-end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred.

NOTE 1 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

D. <u>Encumbrances</u>

Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. Encumbrances are liquidated when the commitments are paid.

E. <u>Deposits and Investments</u>

In accordance with Education Code Sections 15357 and 41001, the District maintains a portion of its cash in the Yuba County Treasury. The county pools these funds with those of other districts in the county and invests the cash. These pooled funds are carried at cost, which approximates market value. Interest earned is deposited quarterly into participating funds. Any investment losses are proportionately shared by all funds in the pool.

F. <u>Use of Estimates</u>

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

G. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Annual budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles for all government funds. By state law, the District's governing board must adopt a budget no later than July 1. A public hearing must be conducted to receive comments prior to adoption. The District's governing board satisfied these requirements.

These budgets are revised by the District's governing board during the year to consider unanticipated income and expenditures. Formal budgetary integration was employed as a management control device during the year for all budgeted funds. The District employs budget control by minor object and by individual appropriation accounts. Expenditures cannot legally exceed appropriations by major object account.

H. Fund Balance

Under GASB Statement No. 54, fund balance is divided into five classifications based primarily on the extent to which the District is bound to observe constraints imposed upon the use of the resources in the governmental funds. The fund balance in Measure P is considered restricted.

The restricted fund balance classification reflects amounts subject to externally imposed and legally enforceable constraints. Such constraints may be imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or may be imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Summary of Cash and Investments

Cash and investments as of June 30, 2018 are classified in the accompanying financial statements as cash in county treasury for \$15,712. The California School Accounting Manual requires school districts to report "cash in county treasury" to be reported as cash instead of investments due to the pooled nature of the deposit and the ability of school districts to access funds immediately and with no restrictions.

Policies and Practices

The District is authorized under California Government Code to make direct investments in local agency bonds, notes, or warrants within the State; U.S. Treasury instruments; registered State warrants or treasury notes; securities of the U.S. Government, or its agencies; bankers acceptances; commercial paper; certificates of deposit placed with commercial banks and/or savings and loan companies; repurchase or reverse repurchase agreements; medium term corporate notes; shares of beneficial interest issued by diversified management companies, certificates of participation, obligations with first priority security; and collateralized mortgage obligations. Investments of debt proceeds held by trustees are governed by the provisions of debt agreements rather than the general provisions of the California Government Code. These provisions allow for the acquisition of investment agreements with maturities up to 30 years.

Cash in County Treasury – The District is considered to be an involuntary participant in an external investment pool as the District is required to deposit all receipts and collections of monies with their County Treasurer (Education Code Section 41001). The fair value of the District's investment in the pool is reported in the accounting financial statements at amounts based upon the District's pro-rata share of the fair value provided by the County Treasurer for the entire portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of that portfolio). The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by the County Treasurer, which is recorded on the amortized cost basis.

General Authorizations

Except for investments by trustees of debt proceeds, the authority to invest District funds deposited with the county treasury is delegated to the County Treasurer and Tax Collector. The table below identifies examples of the investment types permitted in the investment policy:

Limitations as they relate to interest rate risk, credit risk, and concentration of credit risk are described below:

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates. The District manages its exposure to interest rate risk by investing in the County Treasury. The District maintains an investment with the Yuba County Investment Pool with a fair value of approximately \$15,661 and an amortized book value of \$15,712. The District's average weighted maturity for this pool is 332 days.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that an issuer of an investment will not fulfill its obligation to the holder of the investment. This is measured by the assignment of a rating by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization. The investments in the County Treasury are not required to be rated. As of June 30, 2018, the pooled investments in the County Treasury were rated at least A.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS (continued)

Concentration of Credit Risk

The investment policy of the District contains no limitations on the amount that can be invested in any one issuer beyond the amount stipulated by the California Government Code. District investments that are greater than 5 percent of total investments are in either an external investment pool or mutual funds and are therefore exempt.

Fair Value

The District categorizes the fair value measurements of its investments based on the hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure an asset's fair value. The following provides a summary of the hierarchy used to measure fair value:

Level 1 - Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets.

Level 2 - Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs should be developed using the best information available under the circumstances, which might include the District's own data. The District should adjust that data if reasonable available information indicates that other market participants would use different data or certain circumstances specific to the District are not available to other market participants.

Uncategorized - Investments in the Yuba County Treasury Investment Pool are not measured using the input levels above because the District's transactions are based on a stable net asset value per share. All contributions and redemptions are transacted at \$1.00 net asset value per share.

The District held \$15,661 in uncategorized investments related to the Measure P Bond Building Fund's investment in the Yuba County Treasury.

NOTE 3 – MEASURE P GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

In an election held in November 2008, the voters authorized the District to issue and sell not more than \$47 million in general obligation bonds. Under such voters' authorization, there has been bond issuances with terms summarized as follows:

2016 Refunding Bonds

On October 25, 2016, the District issued \$28,515,000 of General Obligation Bonds to refund a portion of the 2009 current interest General Obligation Bonds. The bonds mature serially in varying amounts during the succeeding years through August 2034, with interest rates ranging from 3.0% through 5.0%. As a result, the refunded bonds are considered to be defeased, and the related liability for the bonds has been removed from the District's financial statements. Amounts paid to the refunded bond escrow agent in excess of the outstanding debt at the time of payment are recorded as deferred charges on refunding on the statement of net position and are amortized as an expense over the life of the bond. Deferred charges on refunding of \$3,334,692 remain to be amortized. This refunding reduced total debt service payments by \$1,021,174. Measure P Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee and Governing Board Members of the Marysville Joint Unified School District Marysville, California

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the Measure P Bond Building Fund, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2018, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Measure P Bond Building Fund's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated January 24, 2019.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Measure P Bond Building Fund's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Measure P Bond Building Fund's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Measure P Bond Building Fund's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

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Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Measure P Bond Building Fund's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. REPORT ON PERFORMANCE

Independent Auditors' Report

Measure P Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee and Governing Board Members of the Marysville Joint Unified School District Marysville, California

Report on Performance

We have audited Marysville Joint Unified School District's compliance with the performance audit procedures described in the 2017-18 Guide for Annual Audits of K-12 Local Education Agencies and State Compliance Reporting, prescribed in Title 5, California Code of Regulations, section 19810, that could have a direct and material effect on Maryville Joint Unified School District's Measure P Bond Building Fund for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018, as identified below.

Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to local school construction bonds.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance of Marysville Joint Unified School District's Measure P Bond Building Fund based on our performance audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our performance audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the 2017-18 Guide for Annual Audits of K-12 Local Education Agencies and State Compliance Reporting, prescribed in Title 5, California Code of Regulations, section 19810. Those standards require that we plan and perform the performance audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on the local school construction bonds noted on the following page occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about Marysville Joint Unified School District's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We believe that our performance audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion on compliance with the requirements referred to above. However, our audit does not provide a legal determination of Marysville Joint Unified School District's compliance with those requirements.

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Opinion on Performance

In our opinion, Marysville Joint Unified School District complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that are applicable to the Measure P Bond Building Fund noted below for the year ended June 30, 2018.

Procedures Performed

In connection with the performance audit referred to above, we selected and tested transactions and records to determine Marysville Joint Unified School District 's compliance with the state laws and regulations applicable to the Financial Audit Procedures and Performance Audit Procedures over the Measure P Bond Building Fund. Additional agreed upon procedures relating the Measure P Bond Building Fund may also be included.

The results of the procedures performed, and the related results are further described in the accompanying performance audit results following this Report on Performance.

SECTION I – FINANCIAL AUDIT PROCEDURES

Financial Statements

As mentioned in the Report on Financial Statements, we have issued an unmodified opinion over the financial statements of the Measure P Bond Building Fund as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018.

Internal Control Evaluation

We tested internal controls over financial reporting and compliance with laws, regulations, or provisions of contracts or agreements and have determined through our inquiry of management and our evaluation of District processes that no significant deficiencies were noted.

SECTION II - PERFORMANCE AUDIT PROCEDURES

Facility Project Expenditures

We selected a representative sample of expenditures charged to the Measure P Bond Building Fund and reviewed supporting documentation to ensure funds were properly expended on specific project(s) listed in the text of the Measure P ballot.

We tested approximately \$36,015 of warrant expenditures or 79% for validity, allowability and accuracy and concluded that the sampled expenditures were in compliance with the terms of Measure P ballot language, the District approved facilities plan, and applicable state laws and regulations.

Personnel Expenditures

Based on review of expenditure detail, we noted that there were no salaries or benefits charged to the Measure P Bond Building Fund during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018. Audit procedures over personnel expenditures were not applicable.

Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee

In accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 1908 and Education Code (Ed Code) Section 15278, the District is required to establish a bond oversight committee for Proposition 39 bonds to include one active member from each of the following sectors: a business organization, senior citizens organization, bona fide taxpayers' association, parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the District and a parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the District who is also a member of a parent teacher association. Additionally, no employee or official of the District shall be appointed to the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee.

As of June 30, 2016, the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee disbanded due to completion of major construction projects. The District is actively seeking to fill all vacant positions for the 2018-19 fiscal year.
