

#### TEACHERS EXPLORE STEAM AT KICKOFF EVENT AT CORDUA

The event began with an enthusiastic greeting from Superintendent Dr. Fal Asrani and was followed by a keynote presentation from David Culberhouse of San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Culberhouse spoke about the importance of preparing students for the careers of the future, many of which do not yet exist.

Through hands-on exploration, critical thinking, and problem solving — all important components of STEAM lessons — students will build the skills necessary for success in an ever changing workforce. After the keynote presentation, teachers explored materials and resources that will be available to them, including 4-H kits, coding lessons, Yuba Water Agency curriculum, and STEAM workshop activities. The evening ended with a fabulous dinner catered by Lindhurst High Schools' Culinary Arts Teacher, Chef Tim Levitt.

This event was the first step in building a team of teachers who will be working together over the next few years to include meaningful STEAM activities and project-based learning in their classrooms.

### SUMMER SCHOOL REGISTRATION OPEN FOR GRADES TK-8

The Marysville Joint Unified School District's summer school registration is open to all existing students in grades TK to 8. For students currently enrolled in High School, summer school will be credit recovery only. The high school counselors will register the students directly. For students currently enrolled in TK-8th grade, summer school will start on June 13th and end on June 30th. Classes will run Monday through Thursday from 8:30am-12pm. Breakfast and lunch will be provided. Transportation will also be provided as needed to all students.

#### Summer school will be offered at five locations:

- Kynoch Elementary will serve students currently in grades K-6 from Kynoch, Covillaud, Edgewater, Linda, Cordua, Browns Valley, Loma Rica, Foothill, and McKenney.
- Cedar Lane Elementary will serve students currently in grades K-6 from Cedar Lane, Arboga, Ella, Olivehurst, and Johnson Park.
- Yuba Feather will serve students currently in grades K-6 from Yuba Feather and Dobbins.
- Lindhurst High School will serve students currently in grades 7-8 from Yuba Gardens.
- Marysville High School will serve students currently in grades 7-8 from McKenney and Foothill.

### EDGEWATER SEES SMOOTH DAILY DISMISSAL WITH PIKMYKID APP

I think most of us have experienced a chaotic after-school pickup at some point or another. With hundreds of students waiting to go home and parents streaming into the parking lot searching for their child(ren), the situation can become overwhelming rather quickly. But thanks to the PikMyKid App, we have found a system that helps us **dismiss** 500 students in just 10 minutes!

We discovered PikMyKid during collaborative talks with our school safety team and community stakeholders who all agreed that we wanted to find a way to simplify dismissal, engage parents, and keep students safe. Student and staff safety is our number one priority at Edgewater so we were thrilled to find a school safety company that offered tools that empower teachers and parents to keep our kids safe during the school day.

The introduction of PikMyKid has resulted in fewer daily calls to the front office, leaving more time to tackle other tasks. If parents don't have the app or choose not to use it, teachers can also make the changes for them. The platform offers a free reporting system that ensures accountability. For example, we can mark students present or absent or indicate if they are dismissed early. Making dismissal changes are a breeze with the Pikmykid Parent App. Instead of calling the front office to make updates, parents can make pickup, delegation, and attendance changes right from their smartphone.

We can also download reports that show dismissal data, including who picked up a child, the time of dismissal, and the pickup mode. Not every family looks the same; whether it's grandma, uncle, or stepmom, the app allows parents to choose who has pickup permissions and authorize who can make dismissal changes. With the parent notification feature, teachers and administrators can quickly report issues to parents. The PikMyKid app can also send push notifications directly to our parents' smartphones. For our Spanish-speaking families, the Parent App can be used in Spanish on iOS and Android devices.

At Edgewater, parents who have signed up their students for the after-school program or a tutoring session can easily assign their child(ren) the same day or on a specific schedule for the school year. This allows teachers to view a report and send students to the correct areas when the bell rings – taking weekly emails or notes out of the equation. Parents have said this capability is their favorite feature! The app also sends a notification when their child has arrived in the after-school program. Lastly, a huge benefit of this new platform is that it increases time in the classroom and allows more time to focus on learning, which is a win-win! Teamwork truly makes the dream work!

# MJUSD UNDERGOES FEDERAL PROGRAM MONITOR REVIEW

The Marysville Joint Unified School District recently underwent a review called a Federal Program Monitor (FPM). This process was carried out by eight reviewers from the California Department of Education. The District was reviewed in the following areas: Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate, Compensatory Education, English Learner, Fiscal Monitoring, Physical Education, Supporting Effective Instruction, School Support and Improvement, and Uniform Complaint Procedure. There were a total of 72 items reviewed; of those, 66 items (92%) were found to be in compliance.

Superintendent Fal Asrani applauded the hard work that went into the review process. "To have only 6 findings in one identified area confirms that the district operates in a conscientious and compliant manner," she said. "I am very proud of the team."

There are 6 findings that we are required to resolve districtwide. Two of the findings required an update to Board Policies and Administrative Regulations. The other four findings were in the English Learner Program. The findings were EL 01: ELAC meetings, EL 11: EL Authorization, EL 14: ELD Instruction and ELD 15: Student Access to Standard Instructional Programs. MJUSD is committed to updating our policies and procedures to meet the requirements to clear our findings.

# AWARD-WINNING INDEPENDENT FILM NORTH CENTRAL PREMIERS AT LOCAL THEATERS

After three years of hard work, an independent film that was shot at Marysville High School is finally premiering in local movie theaters. *North Central* is a coming of age story that follows a high school student as he navigates through trouble, temptation, dedication, and love.

The filming process began in early 2019 when Alicia Wright, known as Alicia Restivo in the acting world, met LT Coopwood III, a writer and director from Sacramento. Wright, MJUSD's Coordinator of Innovation, was asked to help produce the film and get his story out there to inspire other high school students. Later that year, in June, the Marysville High School track and classrooms were used to film most of the movie. Several members of the MHS track team, including Coach Tarr, were extras in the film and some even had speaking roles! Sadly, one of the track students who was in the film, Jose "Freddy" Ramirez, later died in a car accident, so the film is dedicated to him.

# SITELOGIO DISTRICT-WIDE SOLAR PANEL PROJECT UPDATE

Over the past year a lot of work has been done to upgrade infrastructure and reduce energy consumption thanks to an ongoing partnership with SitelogIQ. The multi-year agreement started in 2020 as an innovative way to accumulate energy savings through energy upgrades that would allow the district to put \$1.5 million back into its general fund each year. The SitelogIO team is working with MJUSD to install solar panels across the district to generate energy to reduce costs, among many other projects. Here is a site update:
