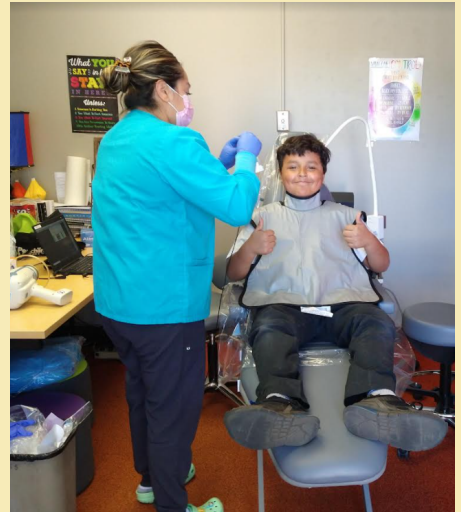

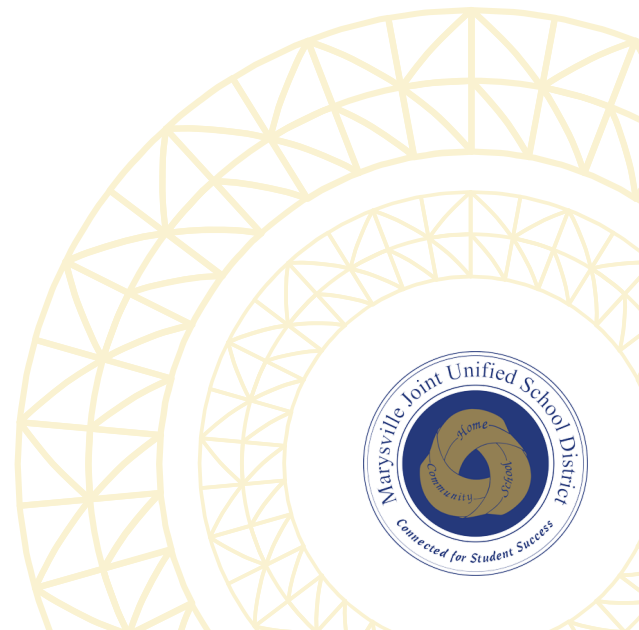

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TRUSTEE SPOTLIGHT: FRANK CRAWFORD

Frank Crawford is a member of the Marysville Joint Unified School District’s Board of Trustees for Trustee Area 2, which includes the school communities of Edgewater, Kynoch, Linda, and McKenney. He was first elected to the Board in 2010 following his retirement from the District after more than 35 years of service.

Mr. Crawford started his career with the District in 1972 as a student teacher at Marysville High School. The following school year, when Lindhurst High School opened, he took a position in special education and stayed at LHS for the next 20 years. During his time teaching there, he also coached track, cross country, and wrestling.

Although his roots in Marysville stretch back over four decades, he hasn’t always lived here. Mr. Crawford was born in Baltimore, Maryland, and raised in Long Beach, California. After graduating high school, he attended college at CSU Chico where he graduated with two bachelor’s degrees in Political Science and Social Welfare and Corrections. He also obtained a special education teaching credential. He then landed his first student teaching gig in Marysville and the rest is history.

Mr. Crawford chose to serve on the Board to keep his connection to the community where he spent his career and raised his family.

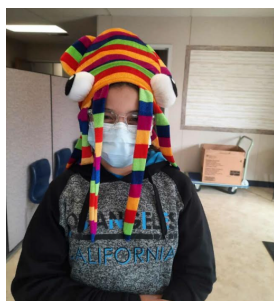

## EDGEWATER ELEMENTARY

Read Across America was celebrated at Edgewater with a variety of dress up days and special activities with the highlight being our annual school-wide Read-a-thon on March 2, where students were encouraged to wear pajamas and enjoy a day focused on reading.

Prior to the Read-a-thon, Edgewater students had read 37,390 books for an average of 44 minutes a day. The day after our Read-a-thon, the number of books read increased by **more than 2,300 books** and set a new reading average of 45 minutes per day.

The Read-a-thon is a big push toward our Annual Accelerated Reader challenge, and this event resulted in an increase in the number of students who earned medals. There were 20 more medals awarded afterward, for a **grand total of 206 medals** earned by our students so far this year! The theme is "You Can do Anything" and the Accelerated Reader competition runs through May 16.

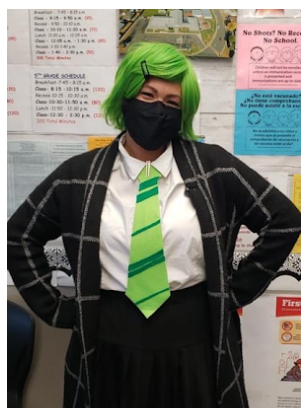

Dr. Ghuman and I are very pleased to announce the launch of our dental outreach program for the Yuba County foothill schools. The first stop for our Happy Tooth Dental pop-up was Loma Rica Elementary School, from March 9th to March 11th. Principal Ashley Vette and her staff rolled out the red carpet for The Happy Tooth team! For three days the counseling room was transformed into the Happy Tooth Dental Office!

Principal Ashley Vette expressed her appreciation for the Happy Tooth Dental team expanding services to the foothills and mountain communities. "Having a dentist on campus allowed students to visit the dentist in an environment they are familiar with," she said. "This low anxiety approach to kid dentistry was well received by our students and families."

To prepare for the event, flyers were sent home with Loma Rica students in February. Families who expressed an interest in dental treatment for their child(ren) were given dental registration packets. Children who registered received a complete dental exam, cleaning, fluoride treatment, oral health supplies, and prizes. Urgent restorative procedures were also provided to kids experiencing tooth pain. The students were enthusiastic about their dental appointments. Even kids who didn't register for dental care were excited to check it out, meet us, and ask questions during recess. For those needing additional treatment, follow-up appointments were scheduled at the Happy Toothmobile. When needed, we will arrange transport to the Happy Toothmobile for follow-up appointments.

The Happy Tooth Dental team was really impressed with the Loma Rica Mustangs, who were all so friendly, polite, and happy to share their beautiful campus with us. Plus, big BONUS – we were present for Flag Pole Friday and got to witness our first Mustang Stampede! I even had the honor of giving a shout out to the newest inductees of The Happy Tooth Zero Cavity Club during the student recognition ceremony. We are already looking forward to our next visit to Loma Rica.

Our hope is to increase access to dental treatment for families living in the foothills by "popping-up" every couple of months at our more remote schools. We are very grateful for First 5's support to help bring our vision to life. The hard work and dedication of our Happy Tooth Dental team is what brings the real magic!

Our next Happy Tooth pop-up is already being planned for another remote school site, details coming soon! 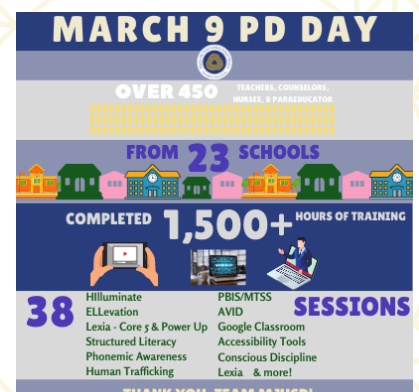

# BROWNS VALLEY, CORDUA PROGRAMS REWARD STUDENTS FOR POSITIVE BEHAVIOR

Browns Valley and Cordua elementary schools are focused on fostering a connection to school, setting expectations, and recognizing positive behavior as well as academic successes. These areas are given priority through the use of PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports), an initiative supported by our district. The PBIS programs at Browns Valley and Cordua are shaped by staff so that they are reflective of the needs and strengths of each school site. The expectations at both sites call for students to be Safe, Respectful, Responsible, and Problem Solvers.

PBIS programs rely on data to generate strategic planning. This year we are not only analyzing discipline and referral data to target areas for improvement, we are also reviewing data highlighting students who have been recognized for their efforts. We have created a PBIS tab on each school's website for parents that includes a brief explanation about PBIS along with our team goals.

Providing positive recognition for students takes many forms and is tied to our expectations of being Safe, Respectful, Responsible, and Problem Solvers. This recognition is the part of our work that is both rewarding and fun! The experiences and acknowledgments in our programs range from ordering items in our student stores, receiving awards at assemblies to using beaver bravos and comet cash to purchase experiences like a students versus staff kickball game or a red carpet moment at an assembly.

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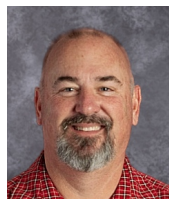

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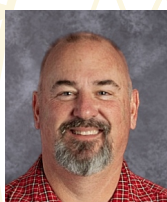
