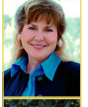

TRUSTEE SPOTLIGHT: GARY CRIDDLE

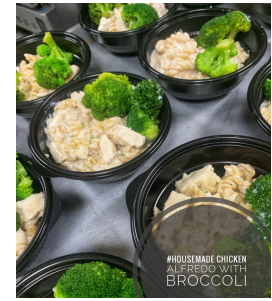
Marysville native Gary Criddle currently serves as Vice President of the MJUSD Board of Trustees. He was elected to serve on the Board in 2020.

Mr. Criddle's history in the area stretches back over a century, when his great-grandfather Charles Criddle first came to Yuba County in 1905 and worked on a gold dredger at Hammonton.

Gary was raised in Marysville and attended Kynoch, McKenney, and MHS (class of 1991). He went on to attend Yuba College and transferred to CSU, Chico where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Communications. He later attended National University to complete his teaching credential and earn a Master's degree in Education.

Gary's career in education began in 2000 and one year later he took a hiatus to pursue other interests; he returned to the profession in 2009 when he realized that being a teacher was in his blood. His mother retired as a teacher at Cedar Lane and his grandmother also worked as a teacher.

NUTRITION SERVICES STAFF DISH OUT MILLIONS OF FREE MEALS TO STUDENTS

Whether a school is in-person, hybrid, or a distance learning model, nutritious meals and snacks help students stay focused and engaged while learning. Starting with the first day that school was cancelled early on in the pandemic, in March 2020, meals were offered to children in our community via walk-up or drive-thru locations in order to meet our community's needs.

From March 2020 to July 2021, 2.5 million meals were served to students and non-enrolled children in our community. Since school resumed in August 2021, we are serving 2 to 3 meals to our students daily. Our team takes pride in the meals they make and serve, and the student interaction is often the best part of the day for us!

Many of the main dishes that we offer are made in-house; this ever growing list includes lasagna, chicken chili, enchilada pie, and classics like grilled cheese and deli sandwiches. Please visit www.mjusdnutrition.com and click on the menu page where you will find all school's menus and nutrition information. While the pandemic has restricted the use of self-serve salad bars, we are continuing to offer fresh fruits and vegetables daily and strive to purchase locally grown seasonal produce. For example, our students are currently enjoying plums, pluots, and kiwis from Wild River Farm on Simpson Lane right here in Marysville! This winter we plan on purchasing sweet and delicious satsuma mandarin oranges from Tri-L Mandarin Farm in Oroville, and we plan to purchase some incredible heirloom navel oranges from Papa Citrus in Oroville as we head into the New Year.

Did we mention that all this great food is served to students at no cost? It sounds too good to be true, but it is! Breakfast, lunch, and an after-school supper is served free to enrolled students without the requirement of filling out a meal application form. So give your grocery budget a break and let us take care of breakfast and lunch!

NUTRITION SERVICES GRANT AWARDS 2021-2022

Did you know MJUSD's Nutrition Services team seeks grants to supplement services to our schools? For the 2021-22 school year, we have already been awarded the following:

- **Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) Grant:** This USDA-funded program provides monies to procure fresh fruits and vegetables to be served in the classroom in addition to the regular meal times. Only elementary schools are eligible for this grant.
- **Chef Ann Foundation Systems Assistant Grant:** This grant is providing funds to purchase two new and specialized ovens called a Combi Oven, which uses a combination of steam and convection to improve the quality and efficiency of cooking food and ensure consistent results in each batch.
- **Team Nutrition Taste of California Recipe Grant:** This grant has a local California ingredient focus and aims to standardize recipes to meet the USDA meal patterns to be added to the nation-wide database (Child Nutrition Recipe Box) for school districts in all 50 states to use on their school menus. MJUSD is one of 20 districts awarded in California. Our recognized recipe is called Kickin' Kiwi Chicken Chili Verde - watch the spring menus for this upcoming delicious new dish!

CALIFORNIA GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES COVID-19 VACCINE MANDATE

Earlier this month Gov. Gavin Newsom [announced a statewide COVID-19 vaccine mandate](#) for students to attend in-person learning to be implemented following FDA full approval of the vaccine for their grade span. The mandate, which has not yet been implemented, would add the vaccine to the list of 10 other immunizations required for in-person attendance at public, private, and charter schools. The Newsom administration expects the first vaccine deadline for students in grades 7-12 (ages 12+) to be July 1, 2022. The implementation for grades K -6 (ages 5-11) would follow at a later date, according to the announcement.

Upon full FDA approval of age groups within a grade span, state public health officials will consider the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the United States Department of Health and Human Services, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Academy of Family Physicians prior to implementing a requirement, according to the announcement. Students who are under the age of full approval, but within the grade span, will be required to be vaccinated once they reach the age of full approval (with a reasonable period of time to receive both doses), consistent with existing procedures for other vaccines.

The Governor has also directed that adults be held to at least the same standards as students, so the current verify-or-test requirement for staff working in education will be converted to a vaccine mandate for all staff no later than when the first phase of the student requirement takes effect, according to the announcement.

Because the mandate was not established through the legislature, the requirements must be subject to exemptions for both medical reasons and personal beliefs. The California Department of Public Health will develop the rules for personal and religious exemptions following a public comment period; details for that process have not yet been released.

MJUSD is awaiting further direction from the state before implementing any new vaccine mandate(s). District leaders are committed to keeping our staff, students, and families informed as we move through this process.

SCHOOL SPOTLIGHT: ARBOGA PROJECT LAYS GROUNDWORK FOR SHIFT TO TK-8

The Arboga Elementary School community is thrilled to be making the transition from a K-6 school to a TK-8 school. Expanding our campus will allow us to be the only TK-8 in the district and will help alleviate some of the pressure Yuba Gardens has experienced with its enrollments, as well as give the community the extended grade offerings they have wanted on site for years.

Growth comes with many positives but always brings some challenges as well. As John Maxwell once said, “If we’re growing, we’re always going to be out of our comfort zone.” Part of our challenges this year include a smaller playground, temporary fencing around much of our school, the sounds of construction, and lots of traffic at drop-off and pick-up. Knowing that these challenges are temporary and that the end result will be a beautiful new Multipurpose Room and Cafeteria alongside two new classroom wings and the renovation of our current Cafeteria into a much-needed larger Library and possibly a Maker Space allows us to face these temporary glitches in stride.

Parents have been asking me since 2007, when I first started working at Arboga, if we could make the school a K-8 so I think this transition will make a lot of people happy and will give us the opportunity to work with students and families for two (potentially even three) more years. Also, with the addition of TK, families won’t have to leave our school after preschool to go to another school for TK and then come back; they’ll be able to stay with us the entire time. When asked his thoughts on our expansion, Elementary Student Support Specialist Anthony Nelson, who oversees Cougar Kids and the production of our weekly Cougar Video, had this to say: “I’m very excited to expand our influence and welcome new age groups on our campus. Being able to watch them grow and realize their potential while we grow as educators is why we do what we do.”

We are excited to welcome a Transitional Kindergarten class next year and also to be able to roll out the middle school opening over two years, introducing 7th grade in 2022-2023 and then 8th grade in 2023-2024. The prospect of having the school-wide identity as a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) school, having competitive sports teams at the middle school level and having opportunities for cross-age interaction and continued expansion of our Cougar Kids Leadership program are all reasons for us to look forward to this change.

In anticipation of the STEAM focus, the school will be providing after-school opportunities for some project-based learning STEM/STEAM activities this year and is planning on offering coding and robotics as an option for all of our middle school students, as well as some multimedia offerings that will further allow students to integrate the arts into their learning.

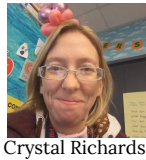

MJUSD STUDENTS EMBARK ON YUBA RIVER SALMON EXPEDITION

Fourth and fifth grade students from Browns Valley and Loma Rica elementary schools embarked on the Yuba River Salmon Expedition last week where they got to raft down the river and learn about the local ecosystem, the salmon life cycle and ecology, and the human impact on salmon.

Before venturing to the river, students learn a tailored curriculum in the classroom and then they head outside for a hands-on learning adventure. For the excursion, naturalists and guides lead the students down the river, pointing out different species of salmon and stopping along the way to do small projects and study the environment around them. Monique Streit, River Education Manager, said they were "honored to be creating the next generation of river stewards."

Loma Rica students were joined by Superintendent Dr. Fal Asrani on their recent field trip, which she said was a wonderful opportunity to spend time with students while taking in the natural wonders in our own backyard. "Our students and their connection to the rivers and their ecosystems is so important to understanding the impact our community has on the larger environment," Dr. Asrani said. "We value this trip and we value our partnership with the local agencies that have done so much over the years to support our schools and our students."

The expeditions are organized by the South Yuba River Citizens League in partnership with rafting guides from H2O Adventures and scientists from the University of California. The program is made possible through a generous grant from Yuba Water Agency that allows students from Title 1 schools in Yuba County to participate free of charge.

MJUSD has faced a shortage of bus drivers throughout the pandemic as have many school districts across the nation. Our dedicated transportation team continues to recruit, hire, and train drivers in our bussing division to expand our transportation offerings. We know our kids and our families and understand the hardship that a lack of transportation puts on them.

Since August we have onboarded new drivers and added a few routes serving the general student population in the Linda, Olivehurst and Arboga areas. We are also serving students at Yuba Gardens and Lindhurst. Our focus right now is to provide transportation in the areas with the biggest need, which are the foothill areas.

Communication has been sent out about the new routes, but ridership is still not at capacity. Available bus routes and times can be found [here](#). Please help spread the word that there is room on our buses. Parents can call us at 530-749-6189. Staffing remains fluid, but as we gain more drivers we will continue to add more routes. We are also currently in talks with Yuba-Sutter Transit to offer bus passes for some students as an alternative option.

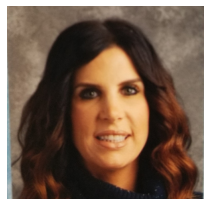

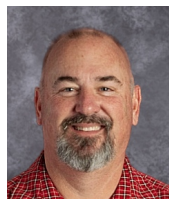

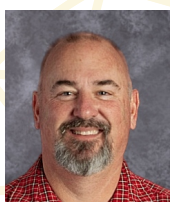
