The last 2 years have been a real struggle for many, and I witnessed first hand the struggles that many other families were faced with during this time. I think this was a bit of a wake up for a lot of parents who started paying more attention to what our children were dealing with as well. I decided to run so I could be active in making meaningful decisions that would protect our kids, and community.

3. What do you hope to accomplish during your term as a MJUSD trustee? I hope to accomplish a return to normalcy in our schools. We are witnessing now some of the after effects of the last 2 years, and we are encountering new problems beginning to arise. I look to work on establishing prosperous relationships with our school's administrators, teachers, and staff to make meaningful change, adapt to these issues, and create solutions. My ultimate hope would be that our children could experience school the way I remember it, without so much negative outside influence.

4. What do you do for work? I earn a living in a few ways. Traditionally, I have been in private banking, investing, and managing my rental property. The last 2 years, I have been in mortgage lending. With the recent shift in the housing market, I have pivoted, and in addition to mortgage, I have begun employment with Yuba County - which has been great!

5. What do you enjoy doing in your free time? Camping! My family and I love to get away for long weekends and disappear to where it is quiet. When striper are running in our rivers, you can usually find me somewhere on a boat fishing for them.

6. Are there any other fun facts you would like to share with the community? I am kind of a low-key nerd. I have discovered a new love for fungus! While in high school, I attended Yuba College as a dual enrollment enrollee. I earned a Bachelor's in Mechanical Engineering from Chico State, a Master's in Educational Technology from Sac State, and a Doctorate in Education from the University of the Pacific.

> 2. Why did you run for office? First, I would like to state what an honor it is to be a trustee representative for MJUSD. I ran for office because I can provide both a meaningful contribution and a broader perspective of the needs of our students, especially when using data (or rebuking the data) to inform our educational practices.

3. What do you hope to accomplish during your term as a MJUSD trustee? Regarding education, I strongly believe in shared governance; all stakeholders, from the taxpayers, educators, parents, and children, should have a participative voice in education. I want to be a good representative voice for my constituents and the students and families MJUSD serves. For about a week before the giveaway, the library serves "Santa's Workshop" where everything is assembled and kept out of sight until it's time for the Christmas giveaway. Covillaud Librarian Mary Lemmenes, who helped distribute the gift bags this week, said the kids get really excited when they see the bags come out. The annual Christmas gift giveaway at Covillaud has been happening for more than 30 years.

"It's so much fun," said Secretary Trina Hammons, who organizes the event. "When you do it for so many years, it just comes together. It doesn't even feel like work."

We can't take all the credit for this incredible program, she continued, explaining that the community partnerships were formed by its founder Donna Cummings many years ago. Donna Cummings began this effort about 35 years ago to help local kids in need after getting to know some of Covillaud's kids as a probation and school safety officer. Mrs. Cummings has since retired and handed the reins over to Mrs. Hammons.

Each year hundreds of volunteers from organizations and businesses including Sierra Central Credit Union, CalTrans, Ellyson Chiropractic, Girls Scouts, and AT&T Pioneers participate in the annual giveaway.

The day after this year's giveaway, Mrs. Hammons said several students came running onto campus, proudly showing off their new outfits. She said it brought a big smile to the staff members' faces; it's those moments that make it all worthwhile.

LOMA RICA STUDENTS ARE READY TO BE A 'CODING HUB' FOR MJUSD

Loma Rica students impressed district leaders last month when they organized a series of presentations and wrote persuasive essays to convince administrators to invest in a license for Code Monkey, a computer programming software that teaches elementary students the basics of coding.

Rachel Ramsey's 4th/5th grade class was introduced to Code Monkey through a 30-day trial she signed up for after attending a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) conference this fall. After only one month, many students had surpassed their teacher in levels, and she now asks them for help. Knowing the trial would soon run out, Ms. Ramsey saw an opportunity for a teachable moment.

If students wanted to continue learning coding through a full version of the web-based program, Ms. Ramsey said they would need to convince the district to fund it. To do this, students began researching the need for coding and wrote persuasive essays based on their findings. They put together a proposal, created a digital presentation, and gave every student a speaking part. Over two days, the students then presented their findings to several district administrators, including the Superintendent and Chief Technology Officer.

The students highlighted how coding ties into math and explained how learning to code fosters higher level thinking and problem solving. They also shared how coding teaches critical technology skills that are important for college and career readiness. The students even went a step further and offered to go into nearby classrooms to teach their peers about coding. They said the "teachers could take a break" while they take over the teaching duties!

Their impactful and persuasive presentation overwhelmingly convinced the district to fund the project; not only for the 4th/5th grade class, but for all classes at Loma Rica Elementary School.

Most students had never presented information to a group like this before. They were proud of their hard work and learned so much through the process. The biggest lesson may have been in the sense of accomplishment felt after they achieved their goal. It was clear to see how hard students worked on this proposal and how dedicated they are to expanding their learning in the field of STEAM education. Ms. Ramsey said her goal is to foster a sense of pride in learning and empower students to connect to the world around them; beyond the walls of the classroom. It looks like she accomplished that and more. Congratulations, Loma Rica, on a job well done!

MJUSD IS CREATING A GRADUATE PROFILE AND WE WANT YOUR HELP

We all want our children to graduate from high school fully equipped with all of the tools and skills that they need to be successful in life. To this end, the Marysville Joint Unified School District, along with the community, is creating a Graduate Profile (sometimes called a Profile of a Graduate or a Learner Profile.) Together with educational partners (including parents, students, staff, and community members) we will spotlight the critical, core competencies that all of our MJUSD students should possess when they graduate. Our Graduate Profile will reflect our dreams, values, hopes, and aspirations for our young people.

What is a graduate profile?

You may or may not be familiar with the idea of a Graduate Profile although it's not an entirely new concept. A Graduate Profile is a well-developed document that a school or district uses to specify the academic, personal, and interpersonal competencies that students should have developed by the time that they graduate from high school. For example, the graduate profile might list attributes such as: the motivation to continue lifelong learning, the skills to adapt to changing technology, and/or the ability to problem-solve and make decisions.

Why create a Graduate Profile?

The Profile is a **clear visualization of priority goals for teaching and learning** that can be easily communicated to students, parents, staff, and the community to align our collective efforts. Furthermore, the Graduate Profile will help guide us in implementing an equity-centered education system with identified preparation benchmarks at each of the grade levels.

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How do we build a Graduate Profile?

The Graduate Profile project started in September 2022, and it will continue until April, 2023. The first step in this project involved conducting a survey in October 2022. The survey was sent to all education partners through email and it was also posted on our MJUSD website. All of our community members were invited to provide input through the survey and over 535 responses were recorded. Next, a leadership group was formed in order to further organize and guide this project.

At this time, we are planning to conduct a series of meetings with educational partners in winter 2023. At these meetings we will review survey data and continue to gather additional information and feedback from various perspectives. The final step will be designing the Graduate Profile report and presenting it to the school board in the spring.

Who will be involved in the process?

Be on the lookout for more information as we journey through the Graduate Profile design process together. A series of parent meetings, community meetings, and staff meetings will be happening soon, and you are invited to participate. These meetings will provide more opportunities for dialogue and input from many voices.

In fact, conversations about the Graduate Profile have already started with some of our Student Engagement and Leadership team members, composed of MJUSD middle school and high school student body officers. This group meets monthly at a Student Forum to discuss how to improve student-centered learning across the district. The students have begun to ask critical questions about this process, such as:

- What skills and competencies do our students need to develop to be successful in the 21st Century?
- What will those competencies look like?
- How would we develop those competencies?

What comes next?

The Graduate Profile, once it is board-adopted, will serve as our community's "North Star" to guide us as we move forward and grow as a school system. For example, we may consider progress indicators at specific grade levels; strategic leadership and/or teacher actions to develop specific competencies. There is much exciting work ahead of us in the years to come as we develop a course of action to meet the goals that the Graduate Profile sets forth. 
SO THANKFUL EVENT WAS A SUCCESS! A BIG THANK YOU TO OUR VOLUNTEERS
