MCAA STUDENT TRAVELS TO WASHINGTON, D.C. TO MARCH FOR AWARENESS

Earlier this month one of our students traveled to the U.S. Capitol to meet with congressional representatives, attend leadership training and march for awareness about tuberous sclerosis, a rare genetic disease she was born with.

Anna Galvin, a senior at Marysville Charter Academy for the Arts, traveled to Washington, D.C., with the Tuberous Sclerosis (TSC) Alliance, a nonprofit that works to advance research for the disease and improve the lives of those living with tuberous sclerosis. In August 2022, Anna applied to become a future leader with the TSC Alliance. She was accepted into the program and invited to travel to the Capitol from February 27 to March 3.

"It was super inspiring and I was happy to have this experience," she said.

During the first day she attended training sessions to prepare for meetings with government officials and to better understand the scope of disease research in need of funding. As a representative of California for the TSC Alliance, she and others shared their stories and talked about how their lives had been impacted by the disease. She spoke with California Congressional Representatives Jimmy Panetta and Kevin Kiley as well as staff members from the offices of Congresswoman Doris Matsui and Senators Diane Feinstein and Alex Padilla.

Anna's journey with TSC started when she was just six months old. She was diagnosed with epilepsy and later with tuberous sclerosis. TSC causes benign cortical tubers to grow in the brain and other areas of the body, including the lungs, heart, kidneys and skin, and can lead to physical and neurological conditions such as epilepsy, autism, strokes and diabetes. Anna said she dealt with mild seizures throughout her childhood, and later experienced grand mal seizures, which involves a loss of consciousness and muscle strength and leads to violent muscle contractions.

"Before, I could play cello, I could run, I could play the piano ... but then when these fall-down seizures happened I developed a fear of what I was doing," she said.

In 2016, when she was 12 years old, a family friend helped fly her to the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio where she spent a week at the Ronald McDonald House and underwent a series of tests. Doctors were able to find medication to keep her seizures under control and it has now been six years without experiencing a seizure.

"For me, I was super lucky. I was able to get my seizures under control, and now because of the research that's being done, I am able to take medication to stop further problems," she said.

As a future leader for the TSC Alliance, Anna has been able to meet with other people living with tuberous sclerosis to platform more resources and information about the disease and the Alliance. Anna is fluent in Russian and attributes this to her being able to connect with people living with this condition on an international level. She plans to record a video detailing her experience with tuberous sclerosis in Russian through the TSC Alliance in hopes of spreading awareness. She also hopes to connect with others in the Yuba-Sutter community who may be living with her condition as well.

"I hope to share my story even further," she said.

MHS TEACHER'S ARTWORK IS ON DISPLAY IN LOCAL GALLERY

Inspired by her Mexican roots and a love for nature, Yesenia is an artist whose work captures the beauty of both. The Lindhurst High School alumna said the first art class she took in high school opened up a world of artistic possibilities. Her first art teacher, Mrs. Greco, encouraged her to pursue art throughout high school and into college, which led her to where she is today.

Yesenia has found in her art a way to express her love for nature and her Mexican roots, creating pieces that are both full of color and emotion. She encourages others to explore their own personal roots and look for the opportunities to learn new things about themselves. Through these discoveries, she hopes that they may find healing in the beauty of nature and of their own culture as much as she did.

She stressed how important it is for educators to learn about their students' cultures and backgrounds because, as a student, feeling seen and supported by her teachers was integral to her success.

"Working with art again on a daily basis really reminded me of my college years and coming back and teaching gave me that inspiration to keep going," she said.

She said she encourages her students to have multiple dreams and to go after them.

The Theater Gallery is also home to several local artists including Dude Green, a metal sculpture artist, and Jesse Harris, an indigenous jewelry and beadwork artist. You can see Yesenia's work on display through Friday, March 31st. Her artwork is available for purchase.

HOW THE MIDDLE COLLEGE ACADEMY DIFFERS FROM THE EARLY COLLEGE PROGRAM

As you may know, the MJUSD Board of Trustees approved **The Middle College Academy** earlier this month. The creation of this small school will not interrupt the continuation of the Early College Program. Both middle and early college programs are offered in partnership with Yuba College and appeal to two different student groups. The Middle College Academy is a separate school on the college campus and students who enroll into this school will get the opportunity to earn both the high school diploma and the AA college degree in four years instead of six years. These students will not be enrolled in a traditional high school campus and are self-driven to balance high academics with internships, job placements and a flexible schedule to maximize their college and career readiness through options offered on the Yuba College campus.

Next year will mark the third year of the **Early College Program**, which is offered at all the high school campuses – Lindhurst High School, Marysville High School, South Lindhurst High School and Marysville Charter Academy for the Arts. Early College students attend morning classes at Yuba College and return to their respective high school in the afternoon. These are students who wish to add college courses on their high school transcript, but enjoy the experiences and opportunities offered on a traditional high school campus. Through this program, students can earn transferable college credits while earning their high school diploma.

Early College Program

- Started in August 2021
- Program offered at traditional high school
- Students complete college courses as part of high school diploma requirements and earn AA or make progress toward AA
- Pre-selected college courses support general studies college classes or general studies AA degree
- Students have access to athletics and extracurricular activities on their high school campus

Middle College Academy

- Starts in August 2023
- Separate high school at Yuba College
- Students on track to complete high school + 2 years of college in 4 years to earn AA degree and high school diploma
- Students select college major of choice in 11th and 12th grades
- Students cannot access athletics and extracurricular activities on their high school campus
- Students may earn a certification while in program, participate in internships, and/or be employed

Both of these academic pathways are designed to improve access to college and career readiness. Participation in an early or middle college program requires a strong work ethic, academic commitment, time management and resilience. Students looking to apply for The Middle College Academy are students who are highly driven to begin working toward not only their high school diploma but also what is typically referred to as "post secondary education." To do this, these students are looking for more than the traditional high school experience.

AN INSIDE LOOK AT MCAA'S CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION PATHWAYS

As the district's only performing and fine arts themed charter school, Marysville Charter Academy for the Arts offers career pathways that prepare students for college and career advancement in the Arts, Media, and Entertainment (AME) Industry Sector. Through this Career Technical Education Program, students have the opportunity to graduate with experience in Design, Visual, & Media Arts, Performing Arts, and Production & Managerial Arts. In addition, MCAA has served as California AME Demonstration School, a recognition of the school's reputation in the arts-education community.

Students from MCAA are active performers in the Yuba Sutter and greater Sacramento Area arts communities and have been recognized in a wide variety of arts and academic programs and competitions.



ARTS, MEDIA & ENTERTAINMENT

Design, Visual & Media Arts Pathway

- Graphic Design
 - Design students study the technique, theory, and practice of computer-based graphic design. Using industry-standard applications and tools, students create the majority of the promotional materials for school events and activities.
 - Students from the Graphic Design program have worked developing professionally applied graphics and promotional materials for a variety of local businesses and government organizations.

Performing Arts Pathway

Dance & Choreography

- Dance students study a variety of techniques including ballet, hip-hop, modern, jazz, and tap. In addition to studying technique, students learn about the creation of choreography and what it takes to be a professional dancer.
- Dance students perform twice yearly in recitals featuring work from student, staff, and local professional choreographers.
- Professional Music
 - Music students are able to take a number of different classes as they prepare to graduate with this AME emphasis. In addition to traditional performance classes, MCAA offers Vocal Music, Piano, Guitar, Songwriting, and Orchestra.
 - Music students regularly compete in local marching band competitions, district-wide music performances, and on-campus recitals at the end of each semester.



- Professional Theatre
 - Theatre students journey through three individual courses which explore performance techniques, theatrical voice and movement, production management, Theatre history and theory, and practical performance activities.
 - Each year students perform in multiple fullscale plays and musicals, some of which tour to local elementary schools to share the joy of live theatre with our youngest MJUSD community members.
 - MCAA Theatre alumni have gone on to work professionally in local and national theatre, film, and television productions!

Production & Managerial Arts Pathway

- Technical Theatre
 - Tech students learn the art and craft of creating live performances from the ground up. From running theatrical lighting to designing props, these students develop an understanding of the "behind the scenes" aspects of dance, theatre, and music.
 - Technical Theatre students regularly create and implement their own original lighting, scenic, and sound designs in both school and local productions and events.

OLIVEHURST'S 'SOARING ZONE' SUPPORTS LEARNING FOR ALL STUDENTS

The Olivehurst Elementary Learning Center, or "The Soaring Zone" as we like to call it, is a place that offers individualized learning opportunities for all students. Whether they have an individualized education plan (IEP) or are in need of targeted intervention, our model gives us the ability to intervene early and provide students the opportunity to work with their general education peers. We are here to support all of our students as they strive to learn and tackle new challenges–both emotionally and academically.

Every student that comes to the learning center is rostered to a general education classroom and provided grade-level curriculum. Not only do they participate in class, but they share fully in enrichment activities with their peers as well. This allows them to engage in all grade level experiences and offers the opportunity for interpersonal growth and enrichment. We feel that this emphasizes our core beliefs about our students.

Our core beliefs for all students at Olivehurst Elementary School are that first, each student has equal value to the classroom and community here at Olivehurst. Second, that this model ensures a common educational experience through meaningful and sustained access to the environment of the general education classroom. Third, that each and every student is a capable learner deserving of instruction reflecting high expectations and assured learning experiences. And fourth, that "The Soaring Zone " creates a unique space for educators because inclusive education requires the shared engagement and combined skills of many people; educators collaborating over their shared students is the essence of what we strive for. Afterall, we share a common vision for our students...success!


