As we get to the last few weeks of school, I want to capture some highlights from this year. I have had the opportunity to meet with parents at every site during my 1:1 site parent meetings and online Let's Connect meetings. It has been an honor and privilege to serve our parent partners in this community.

MJUSD programs, students and staff have won awards and accolades, locally, regionally and nationally. Programs such as FFA, Academic Decathlon and Mock Trial along with individuals and groups of students in music, art and sports have received awards. Several MJUSD teachers, administrators and support staff, have also been recognized across the county and the region. Let's congratulate them. We are so proud of you!

A huge thank you to our community leaders for their support of our Wellness Pledge- a call to action that you will read more about on Page 4. This is a labor of love- our collective commitment to work together to maximize our resources for the well-being of our community.

Our student leaders, the SEAL team, was successful in developing an action that embraces their vision to make community service a part of the high school journey. You can read about this on page 12.

With safety and wellness in the forefront of all decisions, we have made extensive progress with installing door buzzers, cameras and fences to address security at school sites. We have also approved and moved forward with four large projects that have been talked about in this community for decadesbuilding a track and field at both high schools, rebuilding Foothill Intermediate and a new school at Covillaud. All these projects have either already started or will be breaking ground over summer. Shade structures are continuing to go up across several sites as part of the ongoing solar project. Our facilities and technology teams are hard at work to make our schools better each day.

The state of the art Wellness Center at Lindhurst is the first State-of-the-art community wellness facility in this county and similar facilities will be opened at Cedar Lane, Yuba Gardens and Marysvillle High School. Yes, we have been busy and our community leaders have partnered with us to make this happen. We thank them for their ongoing support to ensuring the wellness of students, staff and families.

The Adult School program reopened it's doors after 10 years of closure, graduated 25 adults with their high school diploma and In partnership, served over 200 learners through various programs. Excellent leadership from staff whose commitment has set the course for ongoing success.

Finally, as we head to the graduation and promotion ceremonies, I am excited to shake hands with every senior.

MJUSD SUCCESSFULLY SECURES \$13.5M GRANT FROM CCSPP



MJUSD, like several other school districts across California, wrote the Communities School grant this past March. The grant is to design schools as the hub for the community and bring resources and programs to improve the learning environment. Through the community schools program, the school and the community work together to improve the lives of students, staff and families through coordination of services and resources.

The grant was written by our own staff who did a phenomenal job. 10 schools were identified to receive this grant. Each school identified their priority focus areas and an action plan.

The members of the School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC,) and school leadership teams were equally involved in the discussions related to the development of this project at each site.

District wide data indicates that similar to what is noticed across the nation, students in MJUSD are also struggling with behavior, academics and attendance. We have seen that the concerns have exacerbated after COVID closures ansd has a significant impact on the needs within our school communities. Family stresses have had a direct impact on our students' academic, attendance and discipline. Chronic Absenteeism has doubled since 2018-19, similarly fighting, aggressive behaviors, defiance and abusive language has resulted in significant increase in suspension rates. The funds will be used to design support services at each site to achieve these main goals:

- 1. To improve attendance and academic preparation and decreased discipline
- 2. Identify new community partnerships to support schools in a consistent manner to bridge the gaps in home-school partnerships
- 3. Design academic and co-curricular support for a successful transition to high school and college & career readiness.
- 4. Provide and expand parent education to support the capacity of families

Since last year, wellness has become the focus of our work at MJUSD. We believe that if students, adults and families are physically and mentally well, they will be able to move to the next level of success in their work, school and careers. Leader In Me is an evidence-based, comprehensive training model based on Stephen Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Successful Teens. The facilitator challenged students to hone their leadership and life skills while creating the foundation for a high-trust school culture and sustained academic achievement. Leader in Me helps students find their voice and purpose and apply life-ready leadership skills not only to college and career goals, but a principle-centered life.

ASB leaders from McKenney and Yuba Gardens middle schools joined leaders from Lindhurst and Marysville high schools as well as leaders from North South Lindhurst and South Lindhurst. The May Leader In Me training is a continuation of a series that kicked off in the fall.

Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens has been utilized by millions of people, young and old alike, to make life more rewarding and productive. Highly proactive students recognize that their behavior is a product of their conscious choices.





THE 7 HABITS OF HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL TEENS

Habit 1: Be Proactive- Take the initiative and the responsibility to make things happen.

Habit 2: Begin With The End In Mind- Start with a clear destination so as to understand where you are now, where you're going, and what you value most.

Habit 3: Put First Things First- Manage yourself. Organize and execute around priorities.

Habit 4: Think Win/Win: See life as a cooperative, not competitive, arena where success is not achieved at the expense of exclusion of others.

Habit 5: Seek First To Understand, Then Be Understood-Build the skills of empathetic listening that inspires openness and trust.

Habit 6: Synergize- Apply the principles of cooperative creativity and value differences.

Habit 7: Sharpen The Saw- Preserve and enhance your greatest asset- yourself by renewing the renewing and strengthening the four key dimensions of life – body, brain, heart, and soul.

YUBA GARDENS MUSIC PROGRAM PERFORMS COMMISSIONED PIECE AT SPRING CONCERT







Yuba Gardens Intermediate School is passionate about music! Recently, music composer Randall Standridge wrote a song commissioned by Yuba Garden's Music Director Becky Stewart that debuted at the Yuba Gardens Spring Concert on May 11th.

The song entitled Me (re:Affirmation), takes a deep, emotional dive into the composer's journey of being a victim of bullying and the challenge of learning to love himself in the midst of hate. "Bullying happens to our youth. Bullying happens to our adults. And it is NOT okay," Standridge stated in a social media post. The piece was composed as a lullaby that allowed the composer to figuratively take a step back in time to carry a message to his younger self of, "hey buddy...it's going to be okay." According to Standridge's post, "late in the piece, a defiant heartbeat is heard that grows to the climax, before resolving to a gentle message of hope."

Referring to the performance on May 11th, Yuba Gardens Middle School Music Director Becky Stewart expressed her pride. "This is always an exciting concert because we get to see the students' growth for the year on display," said Stewart. "We were very pleased to commission and perform this piece of beautiful music by Randall Standridge who we admire immensely," she continued. "We are so excited to be a part of "The unBroken Project" which focuses on mental health and provokes discussions about all aspects of mental health," finished Stewart.

Yuba Gardens Band has achieved many high honors. Students have achieved silver, gold, and command performances at regional and state solo and ensemble festivals. As an ensemble, they've achieved Superior ratings at regional festivals and a silver rating at the nationally-ranked Forum Festival. COLLEGE EXPLORATION THROUGH ADVANCEMENT VIA INDIVIDUAL DETERMINATION (AVID)

After 14 years, AVID returns to MJUSD providing students with an opportunity to receive additional academic, social, and emotional support to help them succeed and become college-ready. AVID can be taken as an elective at McKenney Intermediate, Yuba Gardens Intermediate, Lindhurst High School and Marysville High School. The program will be expanding to Arboga School in the 2023-2024 academic year. Foothill Intermediate also provides students an opportunity to be part of AVID, but they have taken a school-wide approach.

During the 2022-2023 school year, AVID schools went on two college trips. Colleges and universities visited include: Chico State, Sacramento State, San Francisco State, UC Berkeley, UC Davis, UC Santa Cruz, and the University of Nevada, Reno. For most students, this was their first time on a college campus. For some, it was their first time traveling beyond the Sacramento region. College visits give students an opportunity to envision themselves continuing their education after high school.



MJUSD SUMMER INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

Choosing the right career path can be intimidating for high school students. A summer internship is the perfect way to answer questions that can help steer students' futures. What does a Physical Therapist really do all day? What about a Teacher? Do students have the patience to work with young kids all day? Do students prefer to work inside or outside all day? Do students have the right stuff to be a radio broadcaster? Participating in a summer internship is the perfect way to answer these types of questions.

This summer, select students have an opportunity to make this decision a little easier with experience gained through an internship. Starting June 7, MJUSD students have the opportunity to be dropped directly into a local business as a Summer Intern.



Through the 4 week (June 7 - July 5) program, students will earn 5 elective credits upon completion of 60 hours of work-based learning. During this timeframe, students will also be enrolled in a weekly 50 minute online class focusing on career exploration and development through the California CareerZone portal.

An internship gives students the opportunity to not only get a first-hand look at the career field they are interested in, but it also provides a hands-on experience to boost a resume, scholarship application, and college application. 
